Course Description	<p>This course will offer an overview of European diplomacy between the 17<sup>th</sup> century and the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. It will focus on the relationships between states, and the role of their leaders (Richelieu, Napoleon III, Bismarck and others) and ideologies (religions, realism, isolationism...) in shaping geopolitics. We will see which factors may explain foreign policy of European nations throughout this period, and how these factors converged to light the flame of the Great War.</p> <p>The course consists of evening lectures in the period between April 21 and May 14.</p> <p>Assessment in this course is pass / fail.</p> <p>This course may be taken as Elective for non-graded credit (3 ECTS) or combined with the course <i>Diplomacy and Technology</i> in Block IV to validate one of the following modules: Comparative Government (Governance), Advanced Governance I or II (Governance), or Advanced Culture and History I or II (Culture and History).</p> <p>If you intend to take the course <i>Diplomatic Profession</i> in Block IV, it is highly recommended that you take this course, either as an elective or as part of a module.</p>
